We are also delivering improvements to our playgrounds and parks. The rebuilding of Thomas James Bridge at Wisemans Ferry is on target for a mid-year completion.

The first section of the eight-metre concrete retaining walls was poured just prior to Christmas and backfilling work has begun. The retaining walls and footings are essential to ensure the rebuilt bridge is resilient to future flood events and will provide reliable access to the Macdonald Valley via Settlers Road for generations to come.

Once the land level is restored, the bridge and road deck will be laid and the hand-cut convict-era sandstone block retaining wall will be rebuilt. All blocks were numbered and mapped before they were removed to ensure they can be placed back in their original position.

Work to repair and stabilise the nearby rockface has also been completed.







## **LIVEABILITY UPDATE**

**Stage 1** of the Windsor Liveability Project is nearing completion and George Street Windsor is looking refreshed, green, shady, and ready to welcome visitors along its new footpaths for many years to come!

Tree planting between Windsor train station to Fitzgerald Street has been completed and we can't wait to see the trees grow bigger, providing much needed shade for pedestrians in the warmer months and then flowers in Springtime.

All footpath paving in this stage has also been completed. Works are still underway on the outdoor dining area in front of Riverview Mall, and on upgrading the pedestrian crossings with new line marking and lights, making them compliant with Australian standards. Remaining works are anticipated to be completed by the end of January, weather permitting.

**Stage 1A**, between Baker Street and Bridge Street, is due to commence in the first quarter of 2025. Work includes lowering the raised dining areas to ground level to expose more of the beautiful heritage sandstone in Windsor. There will be new paved footpaths, potted trees and new street furniture to enhance the eastside seating area near Bridge Street.

**Stage 2**, Windsor Mall, is still in the detailed design stage of planning, with construction anticipated to commence in the second half of 2025.

Windsor Town Centre Revitalisation Project is funded under the Western Parkland City Liveability program, which is part of the Western Sydney City Deal. The Western Sydney City Deal is a partnership between the NSW and Australian Governments and the eight councils of the Western Parkland City.

The project is part of the Greening Our City grant program that is proudly funded by the NSW Government in association with Local Government NSW.

2024 was another very productive year for the renewal of our roads, including ones damaged by flood and weather, and our programmed works as part of our Operational Plan.

The floods and incessant wet weather of 2020–2022 left us with a \$177 million roads and landslips repair bill. Thankfully, the state and federal governments have paid for the vast majority of those repairs through their recovery programs - but the sheer scope of the works required means that certain works had to be prioritised over others, and the full list takes time to work through.

In the 2023/24 financial year, Council spent \$27 million on road and landslip repairs, fixing 22 roads and 10 landslips. This is on top of our \$13 million in programmed works and \$7.9 million in regular maintenance. So far this financial year, Council has spent \$10 million on road and landslip repairs, \$6.7 million in programmed works and \$4 million in regular maintenance.

Major highlights over the past 18 months include:

- Completion of the new Gorricks Run Causeway
- Repair of The Terrace, Windsor sinkhole
- Repair of the Settlers Road landslip
- Upgrade of Packer Road, Blaxlands Ridge
- **Completion of Greens Road reconstruction**

Over the next six months, Council will be working on the following roads and landslip projects:

- Completion of Thomas James Bridge reconstruction
- Cornwallis road and drainage restoration
- Completion of the Percival Street Landslip (adjoining the RAAF base)
- Securing of funds for the April and June 2024 flood events

Council is committed to restoring all of our flood affected roads as quickly as possible. We know it has been a long journey and we thank all our residents for their continued patience.










The upgraded Packer Road at Blaxlands Ridge between Putty Road and West Portland Road is due for completion in February. The 3.6km road provides a vital and timesaving link for communities around Lower Portland and Colo, and the works are a significant safety improvement for motorists.

The works include earth excavation, pavement stabilisation and reconstruction, stormwater drainage culvert reconstruction, safety barrier guard rail installation, retaining wall construction and spray seal.

Trees that were removed for the project to provide a safe margin along the roadside will be replaced with two new plantings of locally native species for each tree lost. Council will nurture these trees until they are established.

With the apple season and school holidays in full swing, Bilpin's orchardists are welcoming hundreds of apple hunters to the area to pick their own or just enjoy the satisfying crunch of fresh apples or equally tasty, peaches, veggies and cider.

# CKING TIME!

The Hawkesbury region attracts a significant number of day trippers each year due to its close proximity to Sydney. The region's activities attract nature lovers, history buffs and family groups, and it is also the perfect location for a weekend getaway.

Being the third oldest colonial settlement in the state after Sydney Cove and Parramatta, our region provides a generous dollop of history, such as the oldest pub on the mainland, Windsor's Macquarie Arms, and the oldest church in the country at Ebenezer. The Australiana Pioneer Village, established in 1970 at Wilberforce, recreates an authentic 1810 village including a bank, police station, shearing shed and more.

There's so much more to discover in the Hawkesbury. Our fully accredited Visitor Information Centre is open 7 days from 9am-4pm at Ham Common in Richmond.

Major improvements are now underway at Macquarie Park in Windsor, breathing fresh life into the beloved riverside recreation space.

The works include added shade structures, picnic facilities, signage and a path and trail network to improve accessibility, landscaping and improved water safety signage. The playground will be upgraded with a new water play area with water pumps, sluice gates and a nature play creek bed; a basket swing, a rope canoe swing spinner and nature balance play.

There will be impacts to playground access and sections of the park during construction. Weather permitting, it is expected these works will be completed in winter 2025.

The \$1.8 million project includes NSW Government funding thanks to its Places to Swim program (\$839,400) and joint funding from the Australian and NSW Governments' Community Local Infrastructure Recovery Package Community Asset Program (\$600,000), with council contributing \$550,000, creating more options for safe recreation around our river.

# YOUR **NEW LOOK** JACK GOW AND FREEMANS REACH RESERVES!

Jack Gow Reserve in McGraths Hill and Freemans Reach Reserve have both unveiled brand new playgrounds!

Both playgrounds were designed following community consultation to ensure the spaces meet the current and ongoing needs of their communities.

Jack Gow Reserve now has a climbing tower with slides, seated and nest swings, ground-level trampoline, see-saw, spinner and play cubby/charging station, riding/walking path, picnic table, benches and seating options, bins, landscaping and shade sails.

Freemans Reach Reserve has a climbing tower with a slide, swings, obstacle course, roundabout, rocker, seating, and beautiful landscaping.

Wilberforce Park was also upgraded with a like-for-like replacement of its play equipment.



Hawkesbury City Council has been crowned as a leader in sustainability, winning the Large Business Sustainability Leadership Award at the NSW Banksia Awards in November.

The award celebrates exceptional commitment and achievements in integrating sustainable practices across our operations. In the aftermath of the 2019/2020 bushfires and consecutive floods, Council developed four foundational sustainability strategic plans addressing Net Zero and Water efficiency, Climate Risk, Urban Greening, and Environmental Sustainability.

Plans for future initiatives will focus on sustainable food systems, resilient infrastructure, and circular economy practices. Council's work will ensure long-term resilience and prosperity for the community.

Council also received a commendation at the Planning Institute of Australia Awards in the Climate Change and Resilience Category for our Climate Change Risk Assessment and Adaptation Action Plan.
